### MULTNOMAH FALLS USFS REPORT By Nicole Lund

Hello Friends of Multnomah Falls volunteers and members. I would like to thank you for the warm welcome I have received from all of you as I start my new position at Multnomah Falls. I have had the opportunity to meet most of the volunteers but would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself for those of you I have yet to meet.

I come originally from Wisconsin, but most recently from Coeur d'Alene, ID where I worked for the research branch of the Forest Service. I have been with the USFS for about 9 years working throughout the interior west. I earned my Bachelor's degree in Forestry/Resource Conservation from the University of Montana, Missoula while continuing my work with the Forest Service.



As is common with any change in personnel, we will all need time to adjust. I know I am new to the Falls, but my eyes are seeing things for the first time. This gives me an advantage as the more experienced we get at something, the more we tend to miss. # NOTHING TO CROW ABOUT by Ron Goodwin

That is because it is not a crow, but a raven. Around Multnomah Falls you will see two big black birds sitting in a tree or patrolling the Historic Highway. If you want to see them up close, park on the picnic side of the highway at Wahkeena Falls. Here they come down and peck at your windshield wipers, mirrors and rubber around the sun roof. They were destroying the windshield wipers while the work party was re-opening the trail.

Usually the raven is described as useful in eating carrion and one of the most clever of birds. Its large size of about 24" long with a wingspan of 4 ½ feet with a large beak makes it just right for getting into garbage cans and other human disposed bags to make a mess. Did I mention the mess left on the cars?



They live in areas where there are no crows all over the state of Oregon from the highest peaks to the ocean shore. Their iridescent purplish/black feathers make them distinctive especially with their loud repetitive "gronk" call. Sometimes they will be soaring up high and looks like a hawk at first. They stay close to their mate and are often seen sitting on a power pole with the larger female telling the male what he has done wrong that day.
