USFS SITE MANAGER REPORT - by Matt Ramich

Let's start this Spring Issue with a big "Happy 2017!!" Boy, oh boy, the weather has truly been quite something. We have had a slew of rain/snow mixture, snow, back to rain, then freezing rain and ice. It just never seems to end. Hopefully by the time this issue is published, we will have gotten somewhat out of these cold, wintery days and broken into a sunny period of weather.

Talking about this weather, I have to mention the trail closure of the section going from the upper plaza, to Benson Bridge, and beyond. Not only have snowy/icy conditions up to the Benson Bridge made this section of trail very hazardous for hiking safely without traction devices on your shoes, but past Shady Creek



bridge several snow drifts have covered the trail. Has this or the gate being closed past the upper plaza stopped the flow of people to Benson Bridge? Pictures and comments say with a resounding, no, this has not stopped people. Going back to the area where snow drifts have covered the trail, people have made a one way footpath to access the bridge. Certain days, this footpath has become very icy and is placed next to the edge. If anyone were to fall, they have a good chance of going over that edge and tumbling down for quite a ways. This hasn't happened and for the people going up to the bridge, this might not even be a thought that crosses their mind. For the people I have ushered out the closed area, I have let them know it takes about six rescue personnel to bring one person out of danger. That puts six other people at risk. Some visitors understand this comment, others just shrug it off.

I am sad to say that Carlos, our go-to guy for the lodge, an employee that has been working at the Falls for around 10 years, and hard worker, has accepted another position closer to home. His last day was January 16, 2017. (Cont. on Pg. 4)

has made visiting more appealing.



IN MEMORIAM




Elda Slack began volunteering at the Falls in 1998 and was faithful in the Visitor Center every Tuesday.

IN MEMORIAM



October 10, 1941 - November 11, 2016

Haldane Ared White was a fourth-generation Portlander with a lifelong love of the outdoors. His heart and soul thrived on the trails of the Pacific Northwest

Hal called 911 during a heart attack while hiking at Catherine Creek in southwest Washington. He died where he was born, Legacy Emmanuel Hospital.

He began hiking in the Columbia Gorge in the 1980s and over the years became a trail expert, leading hikes for the Friends of the Columbia Gorge, Friends of Multnomah Falls, and others. He had a fine photographic eye and enjoyed documenting wildflowers. He completed a month-long camping and hiking trip to Oregon's Wallowa and Steen mountains just two months before his death.

A tireless volunteer, Hal began in 1999 at the Multnomah Falls information desk and on their trails. He served on the Friends of Multnomah Falls board and was named their 2009 Volunteer of the Year. At Leach Botanical Gardens, he worked on garden and path maintenance. Hal was on the team that renovated the Tsuru Island Japanese Garden and bridge in 2013-2015. He volunteered for 17 years for the Friends of the Columbia Gorge doing trail work and as a hike leader.

He enjoys biking, hiking, traveling, camping, photography and kayaking. Wayne has been married for 56 years, they have 3 kids and 4 grandkids.




Herbert D. Mohn lives in Gresham, Oregon
