US FOREST SERVICE REPORT By Nicole LaGioia

Hello Friends of Multnomah Falls.

I believe it is safe to say that summer has officially arrived. I feel justified in saying this since on June 16th we broke the 2,000 visitors per day mark for the first time this year. So the busy season has officially begun. The summer staff has also arrived and the last will start on July 5th. This year we will have Maribel Vidal and Silvia Munoz as the Forest Service staff and starting July 5th we will host 4 Oregon Youth Conservation Corp employees. This will give us a good sized crew for the summer months. Starting July 1st, we will be expanding the visitor center hours to 9-6 weekdays and 8-6 on weekends.



Coming with summer is some good news. This is a statement from Lynn Burditt, Scenic Area Manager "My decision is to immediately construct a temporary trail reroute to provide access to the Overlook Platform during the busy summer season. This decision is based on the public health and safety concerns on this section of trail, high public use, approaching peak use period starting on 4th July holiday, and the ineffectiveness of the closure order."

This means that starting this week (June 18th) there will be some major trail work traffic on the trail, but the trail should be open to the platform by the end of the month. I will be working hard with the trail crew to complete this project.

SCORPIONS AT THE FALLS by Ron Goodwin

There have been sightings by visitors up by the Benson Bridge in the past of small scorpions, but were they true? Last year our summer ranger, Maribel Videl, spotted the small black one dead along the trail near the

Falls. It was then glued to the piece of wood in the nature display case.

The ones you see here are a Northwest Forest Scorpion (Uroctonus mordax). Its habitat is rotten logs where it is damp and cool and it likes high humidity. They are shy and play dead when disturbed and then move away. Their



venom is a 1 out of 5 and they usually use their pincers on prey such as spiders, etc. They take 2 years to mature and live 3-4 years and are said to be easy to keep. People have seen them in both a lighter and darker colors. They only grow to be 3 inches in size.

Check out the one in the display case and if you need something unusual to talk about, here it is.

CANADIAN ARMY VISITS THE FALLS by Ron Goodwin

A week after the trail was closed in May to the viewpoint a group of 10 Canadian Army men were going to go the Benson Bridge until they read the sign about the upper trail closure.

Three came in the Visitor Center and I asked them why they were not going to the bridge. One had read "the trail is closed". I asked who is in charge and they point to the soldier with the white officers hat. I called him in and asked him to read the closure notice.

He agreed that the trail to the bridge was open and I told them to double time it up to the bridge. Off they went and in a few minutes some returned and were standing by the highway waiting for the rest of the group. Just then the Canadian Pacific unit train heading back to Saskatchewan (potash cars) was passing and I said you guys just missed your train. They laughed and said they were from Nova Scotia and this train was not going there. I found out that they were in the USA to visit companies that make equipment for the Canadian Army. They were visiting Portland and now going to Los Angeles.

It is not easy to translate the closure notice for everyone to understand.
