> 4 pm - Arrival & Social 4:45 - Annual Group Photo 5 pm - Potluck BBQ



BUILDING OF THE LARCH MOUNTAIN TRAIL -A NOBLE ENDEAVOR, by James Olsen



There's an excellent photo of the old log bridge over the lower falls hanging above the visitor sign-in desk. It was a viewing structure, and presumably was installed by the Union Pacific Railroad Company for its sightseeing excursion train clients, as the UPRR logo appears in the lower corners. This bridge disappeared in 1900.

As a replacement. Simon Benson contracted a bridge builder and bridge designer in 1914, and in 1915 the iconic bridge as we now know it was in place. The path to view the falls the ended at the bridge. But Samuel C. Lancaster, designer and overseer of the Columbia River Highway wasn't content with hat short path. He pictured a trail to Larch Mountain, and, on January 28th, 1915, presented a "lantern slide" depiction of the Columbia River Gorge scenic wonders to the Progressive Business Men's Club of Portland, and, as a trustee of the PMBC, asked the organization to consider building a trail from Multnomah Falls to Larch Mountain.

Now ask yourself, why would a club of citified take on such a task? The site is thirty miles away, reachable only by rail, and with some seemingly impossible terrain. However, Lancaster was an impressive man, and, as Charles Paul Keyser wrote in his treatise on the Founding of the Trails Club of Oregon, was a man "with plenty of presence; he had the touch."

Howdy everyone!! Summer is upon us, but luckily we haven't lost our precipitation. Yes, there has been some really sunny and hot summer days. Still, the rain continues to fall. Let's hope this keeps happening. Here at Multnomah Falls, the rain has created perfect growing conditions for the local vegetation.

If you haven't already, take a look at the flower beds out in front of the lodge. Rick hired a great landscaper that spread bark dust that looks sharp. The flower bed behind the water fountain received three spirea shrubs, kinnikinnick groundcover, and a rhododendron shrub that all will look beautiful when they reach maturity. The fence surrounding these plantings was put in place to keep dogs and kids out as well as deter vandals from stealing them at night. Keep in mind this is a temporary fence.



I can't continue writing this article without mentioning our two great seasonals I have working with me at the Falls. We have our recurring seasonal Jason Ligons back again for his fourth season and our first timer, Jake Hastings, as our second seasonal. Be sure to welcome them both and make them feel comfortable as we all move into one of the busiest times of the year. You may see other rangers walking around the site. Those would most likely be our field rangers. Three of them, Emily Long, Chelsea Lester, and Marcos Ramirez, have come back for a second year. One last thing to mention. This year, ODOT is piloting a new bus system that goes from the Gateway District to Rooster Rock and on to Multnomah Falls. This bus will cost five dollars if a person gets on at the Gateway District. If you park at Rooster Rock and want to come to the Falls, the ride is free. Brochures about this system can be found in the brochure rack by the front doors. The bus operates only on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and federal holidays. That's about it!! Keep up the good work and may Multnomah Falls keep spirits high as well as inspire our visitors.

We will share good times, delicious picnic fare and visiting with each other and USFS staff picnicking under the cool shade trees. Some of you may remember that this park was first donated in 1929 by Guy W. Talbot and his family and was partly developed by the CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps) between 1933 and 1935.

(Cont. from Page 1) Responding to Lancaster's persuasive plea, Henry R. Hayek, a printer by trade, moved that the PMBC immediately construct the trail. His motion carried unanimously, committing the 384 club members to the endeavor. Hayek's temerity earned him he chair of a six man Larch Mountain Trail committee. A more unified, dedicated, hard-working group could hardly be found. They met two or three nights a week from February through September, 1915. The committee:

Henry R. Hayek, Chair, James, Kerns, and Abbott Co., Printers and Lithographers.

Chester J. Hogue, Architect and Engineer. 1st. Vice President, PBMC.

G.F. Peek, President of Union Abstract Co.

Thomas A. Sherrard, Supervisor, Oregon National Forest (later became Mt. Hood National Forest) US Forest Service.

Jacob Kanzler, Secretary of Civic Bureau, Portland Chamber of Commerce; formerly Multnomah County Judge, Banker and later as Infantry Officer in the Argonne, France, WW I.

In 1915 as the trail was nearing completion, Lancaster wrote "The Larch Mountain Trail soon will be as well-known as the Bright Angel Trail in the Grand Canyon, or any of the famous trails in Yosemite, Rainier, and Yellowstone National Parks." Hyperbole? Regardless, today it seems as such, as countless hikers from afar seek information about that fabled trail from our volunteers in the Visitor Center. To accommodate the impact of these numbers, the first mile of the trail was widened and paved in 1968.
