US FOREST SERVICE UPDATE - By Aaron Pedersen

Even with the slower pace of winter and early spring, we have been going full steam ahead since last summer. A lot has been accomplished on site, both inside and outside the information center. We have finished up installing the new cabinets, TV, DVD, displays and painting the walls. We have also been offering new interpretive programs to the public.

Their have been numerous Forest Service guided hikes in areas throughout the Gorge. The hikes have not always been as well attended as we have hoped, yet we have brought in some revenue and made some good connections with both the public and guest interpreters who have attended the hikes.



This spring has brought many school groups to the Falls for end of the year field trips. Both staff and I have taught programs on geology, human history, plants and animals, as well as site management issues and rules of conduct. This has fuelled some excitement for the programs we will continue to offer this summer.

A new and wonderful tool we have used for programs has been our long awaited interpretive signs. The Friends of Multnomah Falls contributed \$11,046 dollars of publicly donated funds toward the purchase and design of these signs. They are all currently installed in their individual place and look beautiful.

We have also reached another long overdue milestone with the completion of our new full color tri-fold brochure. It has been nearly 9 months since its inception! Lots of time and effort from the friends group has helped it to become the informative and well written piece it is. Remember that the brochure is now a working piece. In the future we will be able to easily make changes or add information. Put some thought into how you would like to see it look in the future and we can make it happen on the next print run.

Changes at the Information Desk





Advances at the front desk of the Visitor Center include the computer set up by U.S. Forest Service ranger Aaron Pedersen and the developer of NW Hiker software along with a weather station. Dennis Stilwell with his Virtual Hikes gave the Friends of Multnomah Falls the computer, wireless connections, flat panel monitor and software with connections to hikes, topographic maps, weather cams, national forests and many other options through the internet connection. We can now answer about any question that may come up from wildflowers to roads open at Crater Lake to what can be seen along most trails. If someone wants a topographic map of a hike we ask for a \$1 donation and print one off for them. Yes, we do have to pay for the printer cartridges and paper.

There is now a weather station on the shelf under the four seasons pictures with the rainfall, wind, temperature and a forecast for the next day that is usually accurate because of the barometric pressure changes. This will be really useful next winter and the east wind starts howling. Aaron placed the wind gauge on the pole between the railroad tracks and I-84. Maybe someday they will have one at the Vista House.

Aaron also found someone to program the DVD shown continuously on the new DVD player so that it will repeat automatically and maybe not burn out the players so quickly. The picture is on a new flat panel TV which now gives us more room in the office for moving about. We are now in the 21st Century.

We now have 50,000 new Multnomah Falls Brochures as the old tri-fold ran out. This has cost the Friends of Multnomah Falls \$11,224 for the printing and about \$1,200 for the design. At the cost of 26 cents each we will have to be more limiting on giving out free brochures with one per family and ask for a donation for more. There are two brochures, one winter and one summer so some people may want one free one and make a donation the get the winter version. We will have to get enough donations to be able to do the next printing in around 3 years if the present average 50 per day are handed out. Thanks to the volunteers in the Visitor Center we are getting more donations than in the past. The expenditures for the 5 new signs and brochures have used up most of the reserves we have accumulated over the last 15 years.
