MULTNOMAH FALLS USFS REPORT By Nicole Lund

Hello Friends of Multnomah Falls volunteers and members! As I am writing this, I am reminded of the changes which are coming. Fall is my favorite season. Growing up in Wisconsin with the change from Summer to Fall comes the beautiful leaf colors, the cool crisp mornings, and the harvest festivals of a farming community. The Falls rains have started and with the new season comes a new appreciation of Multnomah Falls. This new season gives us a chance to reflect, appreciate, and anticipate.

We can reflect on our successful Summer season. The memories of a great Summer. The Summer staff is now back at school. New interpretive events such as Kid's Day were a big success. The visitor center served about 250,000 visitors during the 2011 fiscal year

HERMAN the STURGEON by Ron Goodwin

The current 500 pound 10 foot long Herman is the third one and is much happier in the newer pond with a window at the end so he can view the visitors. The original Herman was taken to the Oregon State Fair for about 50 years and died there. The present Herman was caught in the Columbia in 1998 when the Oregon Wildlife Heritage Foundation built a new natural looking underwater view window at the Bonneville Dam Fish Hatchery for Herman.

The Columbia River is home to both the white and green sturgeon with the white being the most abundant and larger.



They are the largest freshwater fish in North America and can grow to almost 20' and 1,000 pounds at 100+ years. They have existed for 175 million years according to fossil records. They have a cartilaginous skeleton rather than bones. The mouth is on the underside and can be extended downward to suck food (dead fish and clams) off the bottom. They do prefer deep holes in the river.

Sturgeon do spend part of their lives in salt water and are found from the Frasier River in British Columbia to the Sacramento River. They are anadromous like salmon, shad, smelt and lamprey. The historic fish cannot navigate the fish ladders going upstreams above the Bonneville Dam to the Snake River therefore the numbers are getting smaller. They are mature at about 10 years and over 5' long and at 6' are 25 years of age. The legal size for keeping them now is 38" to 54" from the tip of the nose to the V in the tail.


EVENT AT McMENAMIN'S EDGEFIELD
